Many events in the last year have highlighted the need for a more united, engaged, compassionate and caring society. Such a society begins with good families, integrated youth and motivated people of all ages caring about societal health especially pertaining to the wellbeing • of children and youth.

It should not be up to the Rosie Batty's of the world to awaken us to the tragedies that can befall families. The death of Phil Walsh in Adelaide is still very palpable, such loss remains difficult to internalize. Can vulnerable youth be so invisible we don't see these events coming?

This is why the 20th Man Youth Fund is so important. We believe we have set a structure to help. Our comprehensive FULL CIRCLE program has taken shape in 2015 and may become a landmark concept for helping youth more widely.

The FULL CIRCLE strategy is to reach out to disadvantaged youth and those facing our court system to guide them through difficult times. We offer support as well as engagement in the form of sporting and recreational activities, educational assistance, leadership training and eventually work experience and placement programs.

In 2015 we were gratified by the expansion of 'CLUB20', our business donors and supporters. This has ensured financial security for our core work and the 20th Man Youth Fund breaking through the 'million dollar' charitable budget, leading to greater recognition throughout Victoria.

Our achievements this year include assisting -

- Over 260 young people staying in
- 70 young people diverted away from the justice system.
- Over 400 young people playing sport through the Redskins Basketball Club.

- Over 150 'high-issue' young people and their families being helped by our Outreach Program.
- Over 550 young people experiencing activities such as professional sporting
- 45 young people becoming community leaders through our Leadership
- Thousands reached through social education via lectures and CD releases Our billboard partnership with Le Pine Funerals on the danger of knives would be well known to you.

Our founder Les Twentyman is renowned as possibly the number one spokesperson on youth matters. His message on the dangers of 'ICE' and youth isolation has received widespread acknowledgement.

Our dedicated staff led by CEO Wayne Owens and General Manager of Youth Services, Jim Markovski, are guiding the organisation to a new level of respect within the community. We were proud to undertake a full review & audit in 2015 and achieve Government Accreditation as a youth support organisation. I would like to particularly thank all our staff for the extra time and effort required to achieve this

We have managed to expand all our program reach, particularly our 'Back to School Program' which received a wonderful grant from the Miller Foundation that will see it continue to grow over the next few years. Our sincere thanks goes to the Millers along with Ros Andrews, who tirelessly oversees 'Back to School'.

Outreach work and mentoring youth into leadership and fulfilment programs remain our core business, as does our Redskins Basketball Club. On behalf of the Board, I wish to sincerely thank our untiring, dedicated employees. You are a brilliant group who make a real difference to many young people's lives. To our many volunteers, thank you for all your help with

fundraising, events management, book collections and distribution.

As a Board it is our responsibility to oversee that the energy, ideas and work of the Fund and our employees carried out with maximum benefit. To Vicki Klunyk and Bob Falconer APM whom have both retired from the Board this year, many thanks for your valuable contribution. To the rest of the Board thank you for your dedication and commitment to our growth, structure, accreditation and financial viability.

Thank you to all our donors for enabling the fund to continue to grow year on year. Finally our emphasis next year will be to start the detailed planning of and fund raising for a 'new home' and multipurpose facility - 'THE LINK'.





MEET THE BOARD AND MANAGEMENT

Wayne Owens - Chief Executive Officer



A MESSAGE FROM OUR FOUNDER LES TWENTYMAN OAM

THE TIME FOR US TO ACT IS NOW!

OUR great friend and supporter the Dalai Lama nailed it when he said: "We don't have time to waste".

Every dollar, every hour we spend supporting young Australians – particularly those at risk of substance abuse, self-harm, homelessness and hopelessness – is an investment in creating a better and more compassionate society.

Life is short - tragically so for some of the young people we work with - so the time to act is NOW!

In our line of duty there are two sides to the Youth Worker's Story. The Dark Side is the insidious ICE epidemic sweeping our state, high youth unemployment, rising school suspensions, homelessness and the recent explosion in street gangs and teenage crime we're seeing as a result.

The Bright Side is the work our tireless youth workers, staff and dedicated board are doing – with limited resources – to make a difference and show these kids that somebody cares.

Our long-running Back To School program is becoming a world leader

In the past year we've provided textbooks, resources and support for 267 youths – including 73 indigenous kids – to help them receive the education and grounding so essential for their future. We've helped thousands of kids over 26 years.

Richard Tregear, who runs this program, says many of the youths we help are "unaccompanied refugee minors" from war zones in Afghanistan, the Sudan and Iraq, separated from their families. The ones we don't pick up run the risk of ending up on the streets, in gangs or in jail.

Another big positive for us is the young leaders we see graduating through Jim Markovski's excellent Youth Leadership Program and the amazing Redskins Junior Basketball Competition he has run in Braybrook for 20 years.

Adriana Pugliese, our youngest fulltime youth worker, has also received accolades from a local principal for her work in helping a young high school rebel get back on track. She works with and counsels youths referred to us by Victoria Police.

GOVERNMENT FUNDING ESSENTIAL

Without your generous support and essential funding we receive from the State Government, we couldn't do any of this work, and the situation would be much worse.

Thanks to the leadership of our Chairman Dr David Young and CEO Wayne Owens our organisation is now fully accredited by the Department of Health and Human Services. DHHS is funding two of our youth workers for a further four years.

This is great news, but we desperately need more soldiers at the coalface to deal with the increasing challenges. Sadly it's much easier to raise money for cancer research these days than for troubled teenagers or youth at risk.

The youth refuge we built in Sunshine, instigated by businessman and former Western Bulldogs president David Smorgon, recently celebrated its 21st birthday. It has opened its doors to 1500 homeless kids over the years, yet in Victoria alone there are more

than 6000 young people without a home each night, often as a result of domestic violence or dysfunctional families.

Hopefully, other organisations and community leaders will follow our lead in stemming the tide of youth homelessness.

XMAS PARTY AND CLUB 20 GOING STRONG

On a brighter note, our annual Christmas party at the Westend Market Hotel last December put smiles on the faces of 250 kids from low income families.

David Brookes (The Music Men) was MC and Western Bulldogs coach Luke Beveridge attended. Our thanks to the ALH Group and PFD Foods for making this possible. And that's how this organisation began, with a Christmas party for disadvantaged kids, about 30 years ago.

Thanks to CEO Wayne Owens, our groundbreaking CLUB20 coterie of business members is growing and has become a unique community "family". Channel 10 General Manager, Russell Howcroft headlined our CLUB20 Breakfast and Demons coach Paul Roos was a popular drawcard at our Sandringham Footy Club lunch.

Sandringham Football Club also raised money for us with a Sports Lunch featuring Peter Hudson. Our annual Gala Night, with MCs Glenn Ridge and Tekani Perry (from our Youth Leadership group), was another success, highlighted by heartfelt speeches from some of the young people whose lives we've helped turn around.

SUPPORT FROM ROTARY

Rotary has been a consistent support as well. Brighton Rotary raised \$10,000 for us with a Sportsmen's Night featuring Sir Richard Hadlee, Sir Ian Botham and Rodney Hogg. The Rotary Club of Point Gellibrand spends \$6000 every year hosting and cooking food for 60-70 kids from the Redskins Leadership Group at Camp Getaway near Bendigo.

I'd like to thank Chris Byrne of Westpoint Ford who provides me with a vehicle each year as well as sponsoring four different activities for our kids.

Our Street Tours have educated a host of supporters and we recently hosted Jayco and Beacon Lighting. I was also a guest of Horsham Police for three days, speaking at a forum on the ICE drug problems that are devastating communities in the Wimmera and across regional Victoria.

I have been working closely with Supt. Pat Boyle of the Crime Squad, who has completed a thesis on gangs in Victoria, highlighting gang issues and how to identify them. We still have a lot of school suspensions in Victoria, 13,000 last year, and youth unemployment is still way too high.

So there are plenty of challenges ahead of us.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank all our sponsors and supporters, our Chairman Dr David Young, Board Members, CEO Wayne Owens, Administration Manager Angela Rumble and my colleagues Jim Markovski, Richard Tregear, Adriana Pugliese and Gum Mamur, for helping us make a difference.

CRISIS ACCOMMODATION

The "Smorgon 20th Man Fund Accommodation Units" were officially opened by the Hon. Jeff Kennett in 1994 and provides refuge for 70 young homeless people annually. This crucial facility was made possible due to the vision of the Smorgon Family, in association with a large number of community conscious companies, families and individuals. Day to day management of the facility is provided by 'Melbourne City Mission' and continual funding is provided by the Federal Government's 'Supported Accommodation Assistance Program (SAAP)'.

YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICE

Funded by the Department of Human Services, young people aged between 10 – 17 within the cities of Maribyrnong, Moonee Valley and Hobsons Bay are directly referred to the 20th Man Fund Youth Support Program. From here they receive the crucial guidance, counselling and support they need. Working closely with local schools, police and youth service providers; the 20th Man Youth Support Service team engages with young people and assists them to reconnect with their families, schools, and local community.

OUTREACH PROGRAM

Our outreach program- helps young people in crisis. Often dealing with intense issues, our staff meet with young people in their environment. The service provides counselling, support and guidance assisting the young people with positive choices. We work closely with a number of connecting services providing a pathway to rehabilitation, recovery and reintegration.

REDSKINS BASKETBALL CLUB

Founded in 1996, the Redskins Basketball Club actively supports up to 450 young people per year. The Club offers marginalised families from low-socio economic backgrounds opportunities for their children to participate in physical activity through participation in basketball in a safe and friendly environment. The Club's ethos is to encourage, motivate and actively support all children and young people within a safe learning environment, accepting rules, governing conduct & behaviour.

BACK TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

The 20th Man Fund "Back to School" program was founded in 1989 to help young people, deemed homeless by the Commonwealth, stay at, or return to school. Young people receiving the "living away from home" allowance are referred to the 20th Man Fund by student welfare coordinators and from there we provide students with the compulsory text-books & stationery required for the upcoming school year. Every young person deserves the right to access education and the Back to School program ensures that young people already doing it tough, have every opportunity to complete their studies.

YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

The 20th Man 'Young Leadership Program' targets young people annually from various backgrounds who lack self-esteem and self-worth within mainstream society due to personal, social, financial and ethnic circumstances. The program runs a series of workshops and camps over 12 months focusing on building confidence and breaking down the personal barriers restricting them from achieving their full potential. The aim is to equip the young person with the necessary tools to adapt to everyday life and unltimately reach their true potential.

SATURDAY SCHOOL

The "Flemington Primary Tutorial Hub" (Saturday School) is a tutoring program partnersip helping young African children in Melbourne's West maintain their standard of education. Many influences impede young immigrant children from connecting in the classrooms of their new country and the strain on the education system means they simply fall behind. The Saturday School is dedicated to helping these young kids with their learning shortfall so they keep up with other students during the school week. A team of voluntary tutors led by retired professor Dr. Bruce Collier, provide vital one-on-one tutoring with the result being confident young people staying in school and making a positive contribution to their new community.



OUR MISSION

The 20th Man Fund believes every young person deserves the chance to an exceptional life. Through our unconditional support and positive programs we provide hope for at-risk young people.

SOCIAL EDUCATION

Les Twentyman has been on the frontline of heartbreak and hope for over 30 years. As Australia's best known youth-worker and social campaigner, Les has developed his expert opinion the hard way - on the street. Les is well known for his profound delivery of the "message". Whether it be primary or secondary school aged kids, community groups, corporate & business, conference platforms or Government, Les has a unique way of engaging the audience with the issues, the dangers and the pathways to positive results. Les has featured in hundreds of TV, radio, print press interviews and documentaries. Both domestic and international. Most recently Les was featured on Al Jazeera's 101 East Program, screening in 200 countries. Two of our Outreach workers, Richard Tregear and Jim Markovski, also run "social awareness" days for schools and business groups. A "social awareness" day is designed to give a group a "day in the life" experience of a disadvantaged person in Footscray.

EMPLOYMENT PATHWAY

The 20th Man Fund's Employment-Pathway Program (EPP) is a 'sponsored' program designed to place and mentor disadvantaged and disengaged young people with community conscious employers. In an age where youth related issues are at their highest, young people in low-socio economic areas of Melbourne are facing enormous pressure to maintain their education and subsequently gain meaningful employment. Our program focuses on 25 young people per annum and will provide high-intensity counseling – on the jobsite, in the home, with the candidate's family, work colleagues and employer.

UNIQUE EXPERIENCES

Many of our young people feel disconnected from society because they don't experience the joys of normal activities most of us take for granted. Providing an opportunity for disadvantaged youth to participate in a range of fun and unique experiences round out the current suite of 20th Man Fund programs. These include the long-running and iconic Kids Christmas party, theatre projects, sporting events, camps, and community themed activities. Our annual "Cops & Kids" cricket match provides a unique opportunity for young people to see the "human" side of the Victoria Police and in turn members get to build the relationships crucial in community policing.





OUTREACH PROGRAM

Our Outreach Program may be small but in 2014/15 we provided direct support to almost 150 clients including over 40 families. This also involved connecting with over 60 referring support agencies.

The Outreach Program deals with a myriad of issues ranging from accommodation, family breakdown, alcohol and drug use, mental health, and sexual abuse. These issues have a direct effect on the young person, their families and subsequently – the community.

Our goal is harm-minimisation firstly and then constructing pathways to ongoing support, relapse prevention, education, training and employment.

The Outreach Program travels hundreds of kilometres per week, meeting children, young people and families in an environment comfortable for discussion, sharing, and conflict resolution.

Issues affecting young people often lead you to family and it is within family that the key to a resolution can be found.


An effective service requires great local awareness and regional resource knowledge and the 20th Man Fund's team have decades of experience dealing with the changing issues impacting our state.

We endeavour to bring about change and improve the quality of life of a young person and their family.

Thanks to our dedicated workers, because of your hard work, these young people and their families have been impacted with a positive life-change.

A young person struggling with a loss of direction didn't ask to be born into or dragged into crisis. And never did passing judgement from afar solve a problem. The 20th Man Fund never turns anyone away. We are persistent and do not give up.

YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICE

The Youth Support Service (YSS), now in its fifth year, maintains three specialist Youth Support Case Workers across three local municipalities – The City's of Maribyrnong, Moonee Valley, and Hobsons Bay. The State Government has recently committed to re-funding the program, enabling this vital work to continue.

Young people aged 10-17 years who have come to police attention within the past three months, are directly referred to the program via Victoria Police members. The YSS caseload is 70 young people per year.

Our dedicated team offers outreach support; ensuring young people are able to access assistance in a place where they feel most comfortable. Case workers conduct a comprehensive assessment of the young person, explore their goals and link them into our range of 20th Man Fund programs, as well as other community-based programs and services.

Working closely with the local primary and secondary colleges, police and youth service providers; the YSS team engages with young people and assists them to reconnect with education, family and the local community.

We have celebrated many successes within the YSS this year, with several young people securing full time and part time employment, traineeships, apprenticeships, enrolling in courses at TAFE and participating in the Outward Bound program.

The 20th Man Fund is honoured to work alongside Victoria Police and the Department of Health and Human Services. The dedicated intensive support we provide in partnership, enhances lives, adjusts behaviours and encourages the embracing of community standards.

The Youth Support Service instills hope in our young people ensuring they don't become a burden on society.



BACK TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

KEEPING KIDS IN SCHOOL FOR 26 YEARS

This incredible education support program continues to support young Victorians, desperate to stay in school. Managed by iconic outreach worker – Richard Tregear, the program has distributed tens of thousands of books and hundreds of thousands of dollars to Victorian students, for over a quarter of a century.

The Back to School office operates out of Little Saigon Market, Footscray, thanks to the generous support of owners, Loc and Binh.

In 2015 our total number of students gaining full access the program was 267 across 24 different cultural backgrounds.

Females made up 118 of the students and males made up 149 of the students.

Many other students were able to receive ad-hoc books off the shelf.

Of the 267 students who were referred to us, 15 were receiving the Unable to Live At Home Allowance from Centrelink, 51 were students of asylum seekers on a Bridging Visa E, 73 were Indigenous Australians, 29 students were unaccompanied refugee minors and 99 students were extreme cases of families in need.

We were also able to continue our ability to award micro-scholarships to extremely needy students bridging the education gap with those who are experiencing extreme hardship.

As with all educational textbooks, there is a shelf-life and at some point they become outdated. As we strive to have zero waste, this year we managed to send those textbooks outdated in Australia to the Morobe Province in Papua New Guinea. This monumental effort will now extend our education reach to many more children in the Papuan Highlands.

WE ARE SO GRATEFUL

REDSKINS BASKETBALL CLUB

"SHOOTING GOALS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE"

The Redskins Basketball Club celebrates its 20th year in 2015.

The "Redskins" supports marginalized families from low-socio economic and culturally and linguistic diverse backgrounds, with opportunities for their children to participate in recreational activities in a safe, friendly and family environment.

Appearing as a normal Basketball Club from the outside, inside the doors, it is an inspiring workshop of teamwork, tolerance, acceptance, confidence, belief and personal growth.

The Redskins endeavors to provide each young person with the required support to enable each player to achieve their goals.

Since 1996, the Redskins have actively supported 2,600 young people (1,070 girls and 1,530 boys) to actively participate in basketball. To date, the club has won 384 Championships with 287 Runners Up trophies

Over the last twelve months we again supported 42 teams with over 420 children and young people participating.

On the court, during the 2014/15-summer season the Redskins Basketball Club was successful in winning 14 Championships and 10 Runners Up trophies.

During the 2015 winter season the club was successful in winning 15 Championships and 13 Runners Up trophies.

We have two Under-6 years and two Under-8 years teams participating in our development squads.

The Redskins Basketball Club continues to offer many "health and well being" programs in partnership with many generous individuals and other Club benefactors.

This helps form the basis that can be applied to life outside the sporting environment and hopefully challenge the participants' to become worthwhile members of our society.

Through the game of Basketball, Redskins introduces young people to the bigger game of – LIFE.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

MotorOne has supported the program again in 2015. This is their 7th year and we thank them for their ongoing commitment.

The program will target 24 young people from various backgrounds who lack self-esteem and self-worth within mainstream society due to their personal, social, financial and ethnic circumstances. Eligibility into the program involves participants undertaking a formal application process followed by an interview process and parent information session.

This year's program is aimed at young people aged 14 to 17 who show potential to become young leaders, not only within the Redskins Basketball Program, but also in their local community.

The main emphasis of the program is to offer young people – challenging and life-changing experiences resulting in personal development and self-belief. We endeavor to see all the participants gain an increase in self-worth, confidence in public speaking and motivation to achieve positive results within their lives.

During our workshops all participants have a meal together, participate in various activities. 4 participants introduce their "my life" session to the group speaking about their own personal backgrounds, a guest speaker is then introduced who presents to the group allowing for personal questions followed by an evaluation of the evening's workshops ensuring quality improvement.

SATURDAY SCHOOL

The Saturday School, or "Flemington Primary Tutorial Hub" is a partner program tutoring young African immigrants based in Melbourne's West.

Primarily from the Horn of Africa, these young people struggle to keep up at school whilst adjusting to a new language and surroundings. A steady stream of volunteer tutors, led by retired lecturer, Dr. Bruce Coller, spend each Saturday morning in Flemington making sure these new young Aussies don't fall behind

Dr. Coller, who travels each week from Berwick, was awarded a "Senior Achievement Award" during the year at a ceremony at Government House. The school, founded by the Australian African Foundation for Retention Opportunity, ensures these kids reach the standard they need to integrate effectively into our curriculum. Many of these young people have come from war-torn environments and it is very difficult to adjust. Education is the tool that leads to them being a positive contributor to their communities and broader society.

The 20th Man Fund has committed to supporting the Saturday School for another two years and hopes to improve the resources and materials available to the students.

These young people are the future of their culture in Australia. It's vital they receive the support required to achieve their education potential. The Saturday School is doing its part in ensuring these young students maintain an acceptable standard at school.

EMPLOYMENT PATHWAY

The 20th Man Fund's Employment-Pathway Program "community ownership model" program designed to place, and mentor, disadvantaged and disengaged young people with community conscious employers.

In an age where youth related issues are at their highest, young people in low-socio economic areas of Melbourne are facing enormous pressure to maintain their education and subsequently gain meaningful employment.

The Employment Pathway will focus on candidate's family, work colleagues voung people who are "at the back of the line" (so to speak). Those who are 2nd and 3rd generation unemployed, have poor home-life conditions & upbringing, whose likelihood of a job is minimal and who are very likely to become a burden to the Victorian tax-

Our program focuses on 25 young people per annum and will provide high-intensity counseling - on the jobsite, in the home, with the

and employer.

CASE STUDY

My name is Jeff, and looking back on my memories and how far I've personally come, I don't think I would be the same person today without the help and support of the 20th Man Fund - Redskins Youth Leadership Program.

This program has become a passion of mine since I was given the opportunity to be a part of it two years ago and has meant the world to me growing up. My views and values as a boy coming from a multicultural society have helped shape me to become mentally stronger over a short period of time.

Last year I became an advanced leader and took on the role to mentor the younger redskins of the club, giving each individual the opportunity to expose their core values and what they believe in.

What I did as an advanced leader to help and mentor the younger kids may have been a goal of mine in the beginning, but had become second nature to me over time. I am always looking to help and serve my community, fellow basketball club and leadership program members, now looking for greater challenges outside.

I believe that we need to start young because no kid wants to go through life being poor or less fortunate. That's why the 20th Man's Fund leadership program is such a great thing because it helps develop the minds of the younger

generations to grow into strong adult leaders in the future.

The key messages I have developed from this Program are to believe in yourself, your dreams and remember your core

The things I have learnt in two years are more than I've learnt in a lifetime. In life things are not always going to fall your way. You are going to be faced with challenges that may scare you but are beatable. I have faced all that I thought was impossible at the time but I achieved it.

I want to give some of my learning's back to the world, to help with my main passion, which is looking after children and families who have to battle through poverty.

I'd like to leave you with a quote, a quote that symbolises Jim's work and the vision of the 20th Man Fund.

"Leadership is not so much about technique and methods as it is about opening the heart. Leadership is about inspiration - of oneself and of others. Great leadership is about human experiences, not processes. Leadership is not a formula or a program, it is a human activity that comes from the heart and considers the hearts of others. It is an attitude, not a routine".

This is what this program successfully encompasses and achieves. Jeff

CASE STUDY

Julian was referred to the Youth Support Service, (YSS), by Victoria At the time of his YSS case closure, Julian's school attendance Police in early 2015. At the time of referral, Julian's mother was struggling to manage his behaviour at home, there were often verbal outbursts and unreasonable demands made of Mum.

Julian was the perpetrator of domestic violence within his home. often using physical aggression such as punching holes in walls, damaging property or shoving his Mother.

Julian had extended periods of absence from school in 2014, it was a challenge for mum to encourage school attendance and as a result, Julian's academic outcomes in 2014 were poor.

When Julian first engaged with the YSS, he had some clear goals around what he wanted to achieve. He hoped to reconnect with school and engage in recreation programs, he also hoped to address his anger.

In the months that followed, Julian began to understand the impact of his behaviour and realised how it was affecting his relationships with those around him. Julian began to develop an understanding of how his thoughts and feelings influenced his behaviour, and worked at taking control and changing his patterns of thinking.

Julian believed he had identified a career path for himself and saw how school could help him achieve that dream. Within weeks, Julian's school attendance increased dramatically and he began to focus on completing his work.

was well above 80% and he achieved above 70% for most of his exams. Julian was recognised for his efforts at school by being given an Encouragement Award, the first time he had been rewarded at school.

Julian believes the YSS assisted him in becoming a more confident young man, with a clear pathway and a brighter outlook on life.


Julian embraced every opportunity presented to him, participating in recreational programs and getting involved in community events.

In September 2015, at the end of his time in the YSS, Julian agreed to attend a personal development camp for young men. This was a significant milestone for Julian, who had refused to attend a similar program earlier in the year as he felt he lacked the confidence and ability to succeed in the program.

Julian has also agreed to additional long-term support when his time in the YSS came to an end, to assist him in staying on track.

In a short amount of time, this young man has eliminated most of the negative from his life and now has a clear path and a new found confidence to achieve his goals


