While it seems short chronological time since the last report, major social and environmental changes, particularly now on the world stage are evolving with alarming pace. At the Les Twentyman Foundation we remain committed to working with at-risk and disadvantaged Melbourne. youth across are proud to report that we have managed our way through the worst of the COVID pandemic and remain in a strong position. We are in need of continuing internal post COVID structural strengthening appropriate to the changing times. This is being facilitated by a very strong board with new blood and I warmly welcome Mr Aaron Baxter and Mr Simon Weatherill both highly credentialled in business and corporate management, and Simon with intimate knowledge of LTF, having been our temporary CEO.

Our sincere thanks go to Board Member, Ros Andrews retiring after more than 30 years involvement with Les Twentyman, having been instrumental in setting up the 'Back to School Program' before the Foundation was formally established. To Ros our heartfelt thanks from everyone, particularly all those

students you have helped along the way. We wish you well with your charity in Tanzania.

Meanwhile we sincerely thank our CEO, Mr Paul Burke who is introducing structural and program changes to meet the changing times with greater focus on governance and compliance. One of our challenges and potentially biggest developments will be the increasing involvement with the youth growth corridor of the Wyndham City Council. There are currently 130 babies born a week, which equates to a new school being required every 6 weeks!! We see a need to proactively support youth services in this area and in particular (if it was ever possible to raise the money!) to build a youth recreation centre in this community to support youth 24 / 7. Wyndham City Council and Western United Football Club are supporters of this project, so money is the only real issue. It is our sincere wish to get donor support over the next year or two. Social and cultural challenges and a lack of any real government services and infrastructure are real issues that have the potential for disadvantaging many growing minds!!

Our Positive Futures program in schools continues and we hope that the Federal Government will look favourably on extending the funding beyond 2023. Meanwhile our Community Outreach is where Les

started and continues. To everyone at the Foundation thank you for your input over the past twelve months.

On a closing note, I again thank all our sponsors, Club20 members and donors. Next year we look forward to a Gala Dinner and get together while this year's event, the 'Comedians for a Cause' was a great success. Thank you 'Elliot Goblet' (aka Jack Levi) for organising and thank you to all the very talented comedians involved. And to my golfing friends thank you all, you are such a great and generous group of friends. In particular I would like to thank Mr Kevin Halpin for his organisational and management skills in helping us run our annual golf day at The Victoria Golf Club.

Lastly a very special thanks to my cochairman Mr Chris Byrne. Your ease of manner and ever ready personality brightens my day and makes my involvement with LTF a joy.

CEO'S MESSAGE

The health, safety, wellbeing and continuing positive development of the young people we work withis a key priority that underpins all we do at the Les Twentyman Foundation. As our Founder Les Twentyman repeatedly says, "keeping kids out of court rooms and in classrooms" is the central driver to keeping young people on a positive pathway to employment and future success in life.

The COVID-19 lockdowns of our communities may have finished but the effects are still very much with us, particularly with our young people who have effectively lost two years of their lives. The Foundation has been working hard with the young people we work with to address the impact of their disrupted education pathways where school became the loneliness of a computer screen, rather than the social experience of meeting and interacting at school with friends and classmates.

This has seen our Positive Futures inschool Youth Worker program become an even more critical part of our work with at-risk young Victorians, and with funding for this Federal Government program due to conclude in 2023, we will continue to lobby Canberra to continue to what has been a very successful program.

In 2023 the Foundation will also be looking for the State Government to extend funding for the Youth Support Service (YSS) that we run across three local government areas in the western suburbs of Melbourne. YSS is a critical early intervention program that provides support to a young person in their first interaction with the justice system. Around 80 percent of the young people who enter our YSS program have no further contact with the justice system.

Whilst funding cycles are always challenging for a not-for-profit, the Foundation remains confident that given the relatively modest investment from government (keeping one child out of youth detention for a year would fund both programs for 12-months) and the positive outcomes that early intervention that each program brings, which has led to hundreds of kids reengaging with their education and head towards a positive employment pathway, that we will see funding for both these critical programs continued.

In the main the majority of programs that the Foundation delivers to young people in Melbourne, such as Back To School, 96ers basketball and EMBRACE are funded through the generosity of our donors, large and small. To those who have given to the Foundation, I hope you feel a great sense of pride through your association with the Les Twentyman Foundation. Your generosity makes our work possible. Without you we could not deliver the services and

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Outreach Youth Work is an essential part of what we do at the Les Twentyman Foundation. Despite its critical nature, the Foundation receives no government funding for our outreach work in assisting at-risk youth, with this work funded solely by the generosity of our supporters.

Our outreach program focuses on providing key support to young Victorians who are dealing with complex situations, emotional circumstances, and crisis in their lives.

Whilst placing support of young people at the centre of the outreach work, it is also important where we can, to create a positive and stable environment in the home, which is why a critical part of the work performed by our Outreach Youth

Workers is the inclusion of the young person's wider family in the program.

Our aim is to help to support and empower families to create a positive support network around that young person, imperative in helping achieve positive outcomes for the at-risk youth involved in the program.

Once the young person's life has been stabilised, our aim in the Outreach Program is to re-engage the young person with education, further training, or employment, using the LTF's strong network of connections with schools, businesses, training, and employment providers, helping to ensure successful outcomes for young people.





POSITIVE FUTURES

One thing we understand at the Foundation is that the earlier we intervene in the lives of young people in need of help, the more positive the outcomes, which is why our Positive Futures program, which embeds a skilled youth worker within schools is critical to the work that we do.

Working with school leaders and funded by the Federal Department of Social Services, our 'In Schools' youth workers run programs daily with kids across schools in need of support, delivering a personal development program based on respect, self-worth and the importance of education and where needed provide intensive case management to students who need it most.

Positive Futures now in its fourth year and being run across several schools throughout the Southern and South Eastern suburbs. This program continues to be a critical resource for schools and students, helping to keep kids in school and engaged with their education, whilst building respect for themselves, schools, their family, and the community.

CASE STUDY

Penni currently in year in high school was referred to the Positive Futures program by the principal team at her school. Penni was referred due to physical altercation at school that she was involved in.

Les Twentyman youth worker initially met with Penni and her family after the incident – still very shaken up but from instant support from her LTF youth worker Penni felt safe, listened to and connected.

LTF youth worker attended multiple school meetings with Penni and her family to ensure Penni felt safe and connected to her school. There are multiple barriers due to this incident such as public transport, conflict with classes etc. LTF youth was able to provide Penni with support such transport and outreach support, having a safe place at school, contacting her LTF youth worker when feeling overwhelmed.

Penni felt reassured that there was a safety net her LTF youth worker at school for her to rely on. Penni's family were grateful that her LTF youth worker was able to provide transport and outreach support when they are unable to.

Penni still engages with her Youth Worker, and she has been able to build up resilience and is feeling confident in herself.


BACK TO SCHOOL

The Les Twentyman Foundation Back to School program, which has operated since 1984, continues to be one of our most successful and important programs. Education is the key to future employment and ensuring that children have access to the resources, including textbooks and stationery, that they need to stay in school sits at the core of the work of the Foundation – with the program having now helped over 17,000 kids to stay in school to complete their education.

We know that financial barriers are a leading cause of students dropping out of the education system with tragic outcomes for many, including homelessness, addiction, and crime – 75% of those imprisoned have failed to complete a secondary education.

In the past year the Foundation has provided over 650+ students (aged from 4-19) with the necessities to continue their education, this includes a diverse range of children from over 50 differing nationalities – including 30% who identified as First Nation.

Given the cost of sending a kid to school now sits in the many thousands of dollars per child, Back to School could not run without the generous support of our donors and the incredible team of volunteers who assist us each year. We thank all who help to make our Back-to-School program possible.



CASE STUDY

Chloe first came into contact with the Les Twentyman Foundation as her mother volunteered for the Foundation for several years. But life took a devastating turn while Chloe was in Primary School when her mother tragically passed away.

Chloe moved in with her father, who has a disability. Knowing that Chloe's father was in a difficult emotional and financial spot the Foundation's outreach workers offered support.

Living in public housing and unable to afford the costs of schooling, our workers ensured through our Back-to-School program that Chloe was provided with the textbooks and stationery to continue her education. The Foundation also assisted by providing the family food vouchers as well as emotional support.

Chloe has done very well for herself. She is an intelligent young lady about to undertake her Year 12 studies.

To make sure that Chloe didn't feel left out from all her other school mates, when we heard that Chloe and her father were unable to afford her Year 12 jumper, the Les Twentyman Foundation purchased it for her so that she was just like everyone else.

EMBRACE

EMBRACE has been a key part of the Les Twentyman Foundation's work in mentoring young people for the past 15-years and through EMBRACE we invite at-risk young Victorians on a 2-year journey of self-respect and understanding, helping them to create a united admiration as they build and share together a collective knowledge of education, values, living, and functioning together with pride in an environment where everybody has a voice.

Participants are taken out of their comfort zone as they develop life skills that will help them navigate the challenges that life will present to them.

Through the program hundreds of participants have shared a life changing experience, helping them to grow, create a sense of belonging, accept their identity and gain insights through sharing in each other's life experiences, building trust, confidence, connectedness and establishing lifelong friendships.

Through the program participants are given voice to explain their own story in an understanding and non-judgmental environment.

EMBRACE assists participants with life skills that encourage conversations, empowering them to positively contribute to society.

The program is made possible by donors and in the past year 42 young people have benefited from their generosity

CASE STUDY

When Cody, 16, entered the Les Twentyman Foundation EMBRACE program he was suffering from anxiety, depression, and social isolation. Growing up he witnessed too much family violence directed toward his mother and due to being bullied at school he was a regular non-attender, spending most days confined to his bedroom.

His mother recognised his personality began to change as he reached his teenage years. He had very little patience and became easily agitated and aggressive towards family and friends. Cody's mother feared the trauma he witnessed as a child had taken a permanent toll on him and she reached out to the Les Twentyman

Foundation desperate for support in 'getting her son back'.

Cody was hesitant at first, but our youth workers built a positive rapport with him leading to Cody accepting an invitation to participate in the EMBRACE program. After just a few short months his mother was delighted with his progress commenting that; "He is a completely different kid, thank you for giving me my son back! He is helpful, polite, respectful, and finally smiling again.

In addition, Cody's mother recognised improvement in Cody's social and interpersonal skills. "He now has the confidence to speak to others, hold a conversation and maintain eye contact. He is developing friendships with other kids and going out to catch up with them on weekends".

Since participating in the EMBRACE program Cody's school attendance has improved dramatically and together with our youth workers Cody was able to explore his goals for the future leading to him attaining an apprenticeship in his chosen trade.

A young man who temporarily lost his way was assisted by the Les Twentyman Foundation to find a positive path in life and a mother regained her son.

YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICES

There is no more important a period in the life of a troubled youth than when they have their first interaction with Police – which is where our team of Youth Workers from our Youth Support Service (YSS) step in to help young Victorians find a more positive road.

Given the cost to the community of \$500,000 per year to keep a single child in detention, not to mention the destructive consequences on the life of the child and their families – YSS is one of the most important programs run by the Les Twentyman Foundation.

Funded by the Department of Justice and Community Safety the YSS program services the Local Government Areas of Hobsons Bay,
Maribyrnong, and Moonee Valley and in 2021/22
our team of Outreach Youth Workers provided
critical outreach and case management support for
108 young people aged 10 – 17 years, providing
initiative-taking support and early intervention, with
80% of participants not reengaging with the youth
justice system whilst in the program.

The key to our Youth Workers success is in the building of strong and trusting relationships with young people and their families, helping kids to avoid risk-taking, anti-social and dangerous behaviours, and instead refocusing on education and employment.



CASE STUDY

Sarah was initially involved with the 96ers basketball team for a number of years. Through this relationship, two of our YSS youth workers, became understanding of a need for further support for the young person.

The nominated team spent several weeks gaining additional trust and building a greater understanding of Sarah and her situation. Sarah presented as a 16-year-old girl who is local to the Maribyrnong area. She has experienced complex trauma throughout her childhood and at the time of referral, lived with her Father and two siblings.

Sarah engages in high risk-taking behaviours including manners which impact her physical health and safety. Furthermore, Sarah has a range of mental health concerns which were not being addressed by professionals.

Through the initial period of support, a positive relationship was established through recreational activities and expanded to counselling support.

Sarah became increasingly engaged with the youth workers and sought to work more closely with them on addressing some of the barriers which prevented her success.

The Youth Workers began working collaboratively with the school where the young person attends and other professionals to ensure that their needs are being met.

Youth workers conduct regular care team meetings to ensure a collaborative approach. The YSS team has collaborated with the school and the young person to develop and implement an individual education plan. This includes supporting Sarah with transport to and from school and referring to services which are supporting her accommodation needs.

Sarah has begun to engage in schooling and the YSS team are simultaneously working with her to achieve other personal goals which will continue to support their engagement.

Currently, she is well engaged with school and multiple support services which provide holistic support for Sarah. The care team continues to collaborate and build a consistent approach to ensure success for Sarah. Sarah is also participating in a personal development leadership program to develop her purpose and authentic self.

96ers Basketball

Winning over 550 championships and 412 runners up trophies, the 96ers is one of our most popular programs with youth and since 1996 we have seen over 5,500 boys and girls from diverse backgrounds connect to the community through basketball.

Whilst we enjoy celebrating the on court success, it is what happens off court that is where we see the true wins for the kids, who are encouraged to not only actively participate in physical activity, but as importantly to learn of the importance of teamwork, dedication through training to achieve goals and respect for themselves, teammates, competitors and coaches, all within a safe environment, providing them with life skills that can be applied to life outside of the court.

Through the 2021/22 basketball summer season the Foundation supported 16 junior teams with 220 children and young people to come together and participate in sport in a safe, fun and team environment.
