LETTER FROM THE CHAIR David Young

This year, I sadly write my report no longer following the 'Founders Report' from Les Twentyman.

Les sadly passed away unexpectedly on March 30, 2024, taking from the state of Victoria a revered 'social justice warrior' and one of its great champions for our youth.

Les was more than an advocate on youth affairs. He was an ideas person and a passionate driver of early intervention strategies to 'keep kids in classrooms and out of courtrooms' – his favourite saying.

He was rightfully honoured with a State Funeral, at which glowing eulogies and thanks were given for a life devoted to the youth of Victoria by The Premier Jacinta Allan, The Honourable Bill Shorten MP, Les' family members Garry Twentyman and Sandra Papashalis, comedian and his Best Man Jack Levi and myself on behalf of the Foundation.

It was a great honour bestowed upon Les and his family, particularly his wife Cherie, and the Les Twentyman Foundation gives great thanks to the Victorian government and the people of Victoria for this fitting tribute to a great Victorian.

We all have fond memories of this 'larrikan from the west' the boy from Braybrook. The state and the youth of Victoria are all the better for his contribution to youth and social justice issues.

I am proud to say the work of Les Twentyman lives on through the Foundation that bears his name. The Foundation is stronger than it has ever been and continues to strive to meet the challenges of ensuring that every child and young person in Victoria, regardless of circumstances, has an equal opportunity in life.

With our education system in crisis, more than ever, we are driven to bring to life Les's vision of a Youth Worker in every school in the state through our School Outreach Support Service (SOSS).

This is a program needed more than ever in schools across the state with the number of children not attending school at an all-time high, with up to 40,000 children being schooled at home (often due to cultural and bullying issues) and child truancy running at 10%, with an alarming number of teachers suffering abuse from troubled students.

Through SOSS the Les Twentyman Foundation has the program to reduce these horrible statistics and are in positive discussions with the Victorian government to expand our SOSS programs to schools across the western suburbs in 2025.

As a society we must do all we can to help young people make positive decisions as they chart their path in life, and we must give law enforcement and the courts the support they need to divert young people back onto a positive pathway, rather than having to lock them up. Thoughtful, caring and civilized societies (other than for the most egregious of crimes) do not lock up children.

Our Mission and Values:

Our commitment to fostering positive changes and supporting vulnerable youth is our passion. We do this through our well researched and structured programs:

1. Back to School Program: With no government support or funding, the 'Back to School' Program (which provides students with the critical school supplies they need to help them stay in school), could not be delivered without the support of our donors. In the past year the program supported 778 students (a 40% increase) placing significant pressure on our budgets and we are grateful to our donors for coming to the fore to ensure that no young person missed out on getting what they needed to pursue their schooling.

2. Positive Futures Program. Funded by the federal government our 'Positive Futures' program, which places an Outreach Youth Worker in 4 schools in Melbourne's south-east continues to go from strength to strength, with the program so successful that the Foundation is seeking to expand the program (with state government support) to the western suburbs of Melbourne.

3. Youth Support Service (YSS) This remarkably successful program, through which a young person is supported by an Outreach Youth Worker at their first interaction with police or the courts, continues to deliver great outcomes (80% of young people involved in the program do not engage again with the justice system). Which is why it was disappointing that the Victorian government has cut funding to the Foundation for this program. Whilst we continue to lobby for this funding to be reinstated, the Foundation is grateful to our donors who stepped in to ensure that young people in need of help continued to get the support they need.

4. Braybrook 96ers Basketball Club. The 96ers continues to provide a very successful community based inclusive basketball club that is open to all regardless of circumstances. The club is funded through the generosity and kindness of our donors, with this support providing the opportunity for hundreds of disadvantaged young people to come together to play sport in a positive team environment.

5. Outreach Program: Most young people do not experience disconnection in isolation; it is often the environment around them that leaves them 'at-risk' of taking a negative pathway in life. Which is why the heart of this program is to help guide young people to make positive decisions in their own life, decisions that lead to reconnection with society, their education, employment and a positive future.

6. Schools Outreach Support Service (SOSS): An extension of the Foundation's 'Positive Future' program SOSS has commenced with a full-time Outreach Youth Worker being imbedded at a Secondary College in Melbourne's west. Funded principally by the Foundation's donors (with a contribution from the school) this initiative came about as a response to escalating youth crime in Melbourne's west, with the Foundation in discussion with the Victorian government to fund an expansion of the program to multiple schools across the western suburbs.

LETTER FROM THE CEO

30 March 2024 was a sad day for all Victorians as Les Twentyman (OAM) passed away, taking from Victoria the last of the great social justice warriors, and the Foundation gives great thanks to the Victorian Premier Jacinta Allan and her government in honouring Les with the fitting tribute of a State Funeral.

Les, who rose to become a figure of such significance that political leaders from all sides, state Governors, senior representatives of the police, public figures, colleagues, those he supported through his life and the public all coming together at his state funeral to recognise Les' work in advocating for and supporting young people for more than 40 years.

It was an emotional and incredible farewell to the knockabout working class boy from Braybrook who dedicated his life to the service of others.

Whilst all at the Foundation mourned the loss of Les, we have not lost our way and the Foundation remains strong, focussed, growing and committed to protecting and enhancing the legacy that Les leaves behind by continuing to provide early positive intervention and support to disadvantaged youth across Victoria – helping to keep them in classrooms and out of courtrooms.

I often say that I look forward to the day that I am the CEO of an organisation that is running out of work. But the reality is that I am the CEO of an organisation facing continuing growth as more and more young people find themselves falling out of their education and coming to the attention of law enforcement and the Youth Justice system.

A lot of the increase in numbers is the after effect of the COVID 19 pandemic on young people who were locked down for 2 years of their young lives. And no sooner have we emerged from the pandemic we now find that families are confronted by a national cost of living crisis that is adversely impacting those that have the least leaving families across the state at breaking point – some have already broken.

This increase in demand for support has placed an enormous strain on our resources and we remain ever thankful to our supporters whose generous contributions permit us to do the work that we do.

As an organisation we are widely recognised to be a leading provider of successful positive early intervention youth programs with our advice and support being sought by political leaders and government department and agencies as they seek solutions to tackling youth issues that have gripped our state.

Our programs continue to be in demand. Our Back-to-School program faced a more than 40% increase in young people accessing this program in the last year and our State Government funded Youth Support Service (YSS) program that requires the Foundation to work with 105 young people a year came under such pressure that the Foundation overserviced the contract by assisting an additional 40 young people with the costs being covered by our very generous donors.

It was somewhat disappointing to find out during the year that, at a time of increasing need, the Government reduced our YSS budget by \$150,000. Our Federal Government funded Positive Futures in-school Youth Worker program continues to be delivered in schools across Melbourne's south-eastern corridor and continues to achieve positive outcomes in the lives of hundreds of students.

The Schools Outreach Support Service (SOSS), which is based on the Positive Futures in-school Youth Worker program, is currently operating in a Secondary College in Melbourne's west. SOSS is currently funded by the Foundation with a contribution from the school. The Foundation is in discussions with the Victorian Government about expanding the SOSS program using a cluster model across schools in the western and northern suburbs.

The Foundation's basketball Club, the Braybrook 96ers, funded entirely by our donors, continues to see hundreds of young people from disadvantaged families build their confidence, fitness and positive friendships through sport and the Foundation's Outreach Program, a mainstay of the Les Twentyman Foundation, continues to work and support marginalised young people.

Our programs break the cycle of intergenerational poverty and unemployment that afflict so many of the young people we work with, placing them on the road to a positive life and future.

As an organisation the Les Twentyman Foundation could not do this important work without the support of a motivated, caring and dedicated Board who have been nothing but encouraging, steadfast and supportive toward the programs and staff of the Foundation and the young people we work with.

To the Chair and all Board members, thank you. Each and every one of you make a positive difference in the lives of many hundreds of young people.

The Les Twentyman Foundation remains a youth services charity that is more than 50 percent funded through the kindness and generosity of some extraordinary donors and supporters, some through the Foundation's Club20 network and others on a personal philanthropic level.

Without you there would be no Foundation and to all of you we say thank you on behalf of the hundreds of young people that your generous support helps each year.

Finally, to all those who have worked as part of the Foundation's staff over this past 12 months, you have my respect and admiration. You are a very special group of people who do outstanding work in providing early intervention supports to young people in desperate need of help,

GENERAL MANAGER, PROGRAMS REPORT



The Les Twentyman Foundation had quite a year in 2024. Losing Les in March was a shock to us all, and everyone in the LTF team was deeply saddened by his passing. Les the youth worker, leader and friend was integral to our organisations DNA, and we miss him terribly. On reflecting on Les's amazing life, our youth workers resolved to return to our work with kids experiencing disadvantage and trauma as soon as possible, which is exactly what Les would have wanted. This work has involved hundreds of young people and their families who were supported through our programs this year.

Youth Support Service (YSS) and Outreach

The Youth Support Service (YSS) and Outreach programs provide case management for young people aged 10 – 17 years upon first contact with police. The programs offer proactive support and early intervention to divert young people from the youth justice system.

- 145 young people we actively worked with through the Youth Support Service (YSS) program.
- The Foundation supported an additional 26 young people through our donor funded Outreach Program in Melbourne's western suburbs.

Positive Futures and School Outreach Support Service (SOSS)

The Positive Futures and SOSS programs re-engage young people who have already, or are at risk of, disengaging from their education, family and the broader community. The programs are designed to complement school initiatives.

Positive Futures embeds trained youth workers in schools to provide intensive case management and outreach to students and their families who need it most.

- 146 individual students were supported by our youth workers through case management and outreach activities.
- Additionally, Positive Futures and SOSS collectively supported 69 students through group activities aimed at enhancing social and emotional well-being, building self-esteem, and fostering leadership skills

Back To School Program

Back to School provides students with the educational resources they need for the school year, including textbooks and stationery. To qualify for assistance, the young person must be referred to the Les Twentyman Foundation by their school welfare coordinator or other support worker and must fulfil the eligibility criteria. The program also offers an avenue for the donation of quality and relevant second-hand textbooks, diverting them from landfill and giving them a second life.

Braybrook 96ers

Our Braybrook 96ers Basketball Club was established in 1996 and is one of the most inclusive sporting programs in Victoria. Each year, hundreds of young people from all genders and a diverse range of backgrounds build their confidence and fitness while connecting with the local community through our club. We ensure that children and young people from low-socio economic backgrounds can access the opportunity to play sport by lowering costs and providing access to uniforms and equipment.

- Total Registered Players: 268 young people
- Training Participants (Non-registered): Approximately 100 athletes (ages 5-18)

POSITIVE FUTURES & SCHOOL OUTREACH SUPPORT SERVICE (SOSS)

Positive Futures and SOSS continue to strengthen student engagement, improve family connections, and provide pathways for young people to thrive in both school and life.



Launched in 2018, the Positive Futures program has had a transformative impact on secondary schools in Melbourne's southeastern suburbs, including Cheltenham, Edenbrook, Pakenham, and Noble Park Secondary Colleges. Supported by the Federal Government's Department of Social Services, this pioneering initiative has consistently delivered positive outcomes for students, their families, and communities.

The success of Positive Futures led to the development of the School Outreach Support Service (SOSS), which was introduced at Taylors Lakes Secondary College in 2023. While Positive Futures benefits from federal funding, SOSS currently operates through the generosity of donors and contributions from the school. Efforts are underway to expand the SOSS program to other schools across Melbourne's west, with government support actively being pursued.

Both programs focus on re-engaging young people at risk of disconnecting from their education, families, and communities. Evidence shows that early intervention is crucial in helping young people achieve their goals. By embedding highly skilled youth workers within school communities, Positive Futures and SOSS offer tailored, essential support to students—particularly those affected by post-COVID challenges and rising street violence.

In its fifth year of operation, Positive Futures continues to thrive across its participating schools. Over the past year, in-school youth workers successfully engaged with 146 individual students in targeted case management, alongside hundreds of other students being supported in other ways,

demonstrating the program's effectiveness. By building meaningful relationships and addressing individual needs, the program creates a supportive school environment that helps students stay connected to their education and develop respect for themselves, their families, and their communities.

Additionally, Positive Futures and SOSS collectively supported 69 students through group activities aimed at enhancing social and emotional well-being, building self-esteem, and fostering leadership skills. These activities empower students to become leaders in their communities and drive positive change. The programs also offer reintegration plans, mental health campaigns, and family engagement initiatives that significantly improve educational outcomes and help students overcome challenges for long-term success.

Through proactive communication and a holistic approach, Positive Futures and SOSS continue to strengthen student engagement, improve family connections, and provide pathways for young people to thrive in both school and life.



BACK TO SCHOOL

Since its inception in 1989, the Back-to-School Program has significantly impacted the lives of approximately over 20,000 school students and over 400 university students, helping them stay in education.

In the 2023/24 year alone, 778 students were supported by the program, marking an incredible 40.18% increase from the previous year's 555. This surge highlights the growing challenges faced by young people and their families, exacerbated by the COVID pandemic and the cost-of-living crisis. Despite this increased demand, the Les Twentyman Foundation remained dedicated, ensuring every eligible student received the essential resources they needed, including textbooks, stationery, laptops, and scientific calculators.

Our commitment to Indigenous communities was underscored this year, with 251 students, or 32.26% of those supported by Back to School, identifying as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (ATSI). This consistent representation reflects our ongoing mission to prioritise Indigenous youth, maintaining over 30% ATSI involvement in the program over many years.

The program also embraced a diverse range of cultural backgrounds, supporting students from 44 different Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) backgrounds, including students from Afghani, Somali, and Pakistani backgrounds. These efforts extended to 177 schools across 33 catchment areas across Victoria, providing crucial support across a broad educational landscape. Operating annually from late November to February—or until funds are exhausted—the Back- to-School Program relies entirely on the generosity of our donors, with no Local, State or Federal Government support. To participate, students must be referred by their school or support worker and meet specific eligibility criteria. This community- driven initiative underscores the power of collective support in overcoming barriers and ensuring young people have the resources they need to succeed in their education.

BRAYBROOK 96ERS BASKETBALL CLUB

The Braybrook 96ers basketball club is a vibrant community where young people thrive. With 268 young people registered to play during the Summer 2023/24 and Winter 2024 seasons, the club has become a cornerstone of positive youth development.

In addition to the registered players, more than 100 young people participated in training sessions, enhancing their skills while not competing in league play. The club fields 28 teams in the Western Region Junior Basketball Association's Saturday competition.

Thanks to the generous support of Les Twentyman Foundation donors, 125 players

received assistance with reduced registration fees, ensuring that financial constraints did not hinder their participation. The Braybrook 96ers celebrates its diversity, with approximately 53% of registered players either born overseas or having a parent born overseas. This diversity strengthens the club's sense of community, where young people not only sharpen their basketball skills but also build self-esteem, confidence, and life skills such as teamwork, respect, and leadership. The club's holistic approach equips these young athletes with the tools to succeed both on and off the court, paving the way for them to become future leaders and positive role models in their communities.

YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICE (YSS)

This State Government funded program requires the Foundation to work with 105 young people over a 12-month period in 3 local government Council areas, Hobsons Bay, Maribyrnong, and Moonee Valley. However, during the year this program faced significant increased demand leading to the Foundation overservicing the contract and working with an additional 40 young people. The funding for the additional 40 young people was authorised by the Board and utilised donor provided resources. The Board of the Foundation were committed to ensuring that all young people who needed support would received the benefits of the program despite the resources from the State Government being exhausted.

Over the reporting period, the YSS actively engaged with 145 young people, with the majority falling within the age range of 10- 17. Of the 145 young people served through the YSS, 80.5% exhibited no further contact with law enforcement while under our care.

When a young person has their first interaction with

police, it can be a major turning point in their lives, where the choices they make can determine their future.

This is where our team of youth workers from our Youth Support Service (YSS) steps in to help young Victorians find a more positive path.

Of the young people we worked with in this program:

- 85% were Australian born
- 10% hailed from the Horn of Africa
- 5% had roots in New Zealand, the Pacific Islands, and Asia.

The key to our success lies in building strong and trusting relationships with the young people and their families, fostering positive community connections, and refocusing on education and employment opportunities.

Case Study

A 17-year-old male, arrested for robbery and driving without a license, was placed on an 8-week diversion program. The Les Twentyman Foundation (LTF) provided crucial support through its mentorship program, helping him complete his diversion responsibilities. LTF also assisted him in securing full-time employment and guided him in writing a reflection letter on the robbery and an apology letter to the victim and their family. As a result, he successfully completed the program, avoided further legal issues, and took significant steps toward positive change and reintegration into society. *- Beth, Youth Worker*



YOUTH OUTREACH 20 young people engaged with a youth worker

Youth outreach is central to the work of the Les Twentyman Foundation (LTF), offering vital support to young Victorians during their most challenging times. In the past year alone, LTF supported 26 young people facing complex circumstances, helping them regain stability and direction. Our outreach efforts focus on building a robust support network around each young person, including families, schools, sports teams, cultural leaders, and employers, to create an environment where they can make positive choices and progress towards their goals.

Once stability is achieved, we work to reconnect these young people with education, training, or employment, leveraging our extensive network of schools, businesses, and training providers to ensure they can succeed. Through this comprehensive approach, LTF continues to make a meaningful difference in the lives of young people across Victoria.

TAYLORS LAKES ASSEMBLY

7 August 2023

ADVANCED SKIN TECHNOLOGY

28 September 2023


